This year I am confident that my budget will provide the increased visibility I promised to deliver.

Thanks to increased funding from local people there will be 80 additional officers in 2019-20, with a further 27 planned for the following year. The vast majority will be local officers, out on the beat and responding to calls for service in our communities.

The Government has chosen to put the burden of increased police funding onto local taxpayers. While I'm disappointed, I have no option but to take this approach. Without it we would be facing significant reductions in policing. I consulted with residents on my plans and received overwhelming support for which I am grateful.

This budget will make a difference. It will make sure that Leicestershire Police is better placed to protect the people of Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland and provide the service they expect and deserve.

Facts and Figures

The budget for policing Leicestershire in 2019-20 has been set at £187.1M, an increase of £10.88M (6.2%) over the previous year. Of this £114.6M will come from the Government and £72.5M from local people through the council tax. To deliver this budget, the Commissioner will invest significantly from reserves over the next four years.

In line with the Government's expectations, the amount of council tax paid towards policing by a Band D household will rise from £199.23 per year to £223.23 per year.

This is an increase of £24 or 12.0%.

The amount people will pay in other bands can be seen in the table below.
